## Confused By All the Various ⊕ISNEφ Live Action Movie Remakes? Then This Is the Article For You!

With the most anticipated Disney movie, Beauty and The Beast, finally being released this year, Disney has decided to release further information on their progress of remaking the Disney classics; movies such as Mulan, The Lion King, Aladdin, The Little Mermaid, Cruella and others.

Now, let's get down to business. As most of us would know, Mulan has been set for release on the 2nd of November 2018. A lot of controversy has taken place since Disney first announced the remake of this famous 1998 Disney movie. It started with the rumours of a white lead actor/actress at the start of April last year which angered many fans and led to the #whitewashedOUT movement. In the end, it's the merchant who gets credited for defeating China's primary enemy, not Mulan (Yes, ladies and gentlemen, you read that correctly. However, all that was quickly rebuked by Disney who told Vulture, a New York Entertainment Magazine, that:

"The spec script was a jumping-off point for a new take on the story that draws from both the literary ballad of Mulan and Disney's 1998 animated film. Mulan is and will always be the lead character in the story, and all primary roles, including the love interest, are Chinese." Sean Bailey, the President of Motion Picture Production at Walt Disney Studios, calls Mulan a fresh new take on female empowerment, which is really important to the studio. He commented further saying that "Mulan is clearly an empowered-female story but we can also do something new in this reimagining, make it a little more muscular, stronger, with touch of Ridley Scott." To those of you don't know who Ridley Scott is, he is a film producer and director whose films are known for its strong female characters. This Chinese legend based film will also allow the studio the opportunity to impact the overseas markets. "Obviously, the idea of working with collaborators in China is an interesting opportunity too," input Bailey.

In an interview with Screencrush, Niki Caro enthusiastically mentioned that she hasn't started yet so she can't give us any real details but the budget, location and story is offering such a scope for an incredible, muscular piece of girly martial arts extravaganza in China.

Disney is also quick to mention that the remake will include songs from the original film (Thank the Lord!). Even though, The Lion King doesn't have a set release date yet, numerous websites have stated that it will most likely be out in early 2019.

In regards to the remake of Aladdin, Guy Ritchie will be directing alongside Producer Dan Lin, Executive Producer Jonathan Eirich and scriptwriter John August. The film is set to keep many of the musical elements from the original movie. However, there isn't any news to be reported on the cast yet as the casting call had only gone out on the 9th of March. Though, this is good news to fans everywhere as it means the cast won't be whitewashed and will be Middle Eastern.



As per the casting call poster, shooting is to begin this July.

Bailey had mentioned that Guy Ritchie became interested in doing a Disney movie and they talked a lot about it. When it came to Aladdin, Guy said, "My stories are really about street hustlers. That's what I know how to do. And Aladdin is a classic street hustler who makes good." Bailey also pointed out that Guy has his own version of the story in his life. But he wanted to honour and respect the Disney part of it. Bailey further commented that "We never want to feel like we have a playbook to these things because we worry it'll make us creatively complacent. The idea of a highly energized Guy Ritchie Disney musical felt like, 'Oh, we haven't done that before,'."

The producer, Dan Lin had also said in an interview with Collider, a movie/tv show news website that they aren't there to make Prince of Persia but they are going to make it more diverse with more people, and thankfully enough, both Guy and Disney are aiming for that too. Aside from that, he mentioned that Disney has been doing such a great job with all the remakes so far that it sets the bar even higher for the production of Aladdin.

Now on to The Little Mermaid. This movie is still in its early stages of development but we do know that Alan Menken will return to compose and write songs alongside the producer Lin-Manuel Miranda. Announced in May 2016, The Little Mermaid has had its key people dropping out of production. Said people were the directors, Sofia Coppola and Joe Wright and actress Chloe Grace-Mortez.

In February 2016, actress Lindsay Lohan posted a photo of her and Ariel side by side, on her Instagram account, saying she wants to play Ariel in the live-action version of The Little Mermaid if Bill Condon, who is also the director for Beauty and The Beast, helmed the movie. When approached by Vulture at the Beauty and the Beast premiere, Condon replied "I know! It was sweet, it was very sweet of her. I hope she gets to make that movie ... but I'll go see her in the Little Mermaid, absolutely."

Mary Poppins Returns is also due to be released nearing Christmas in 2018. The film involves Emily Blunt, Meryl Streep, Julie Walters, and Lin-Manuel Miranda as the acting cast, Rob Marshall as the director and David Magee, Marc Shaiman and Scott Wittman as the movie's composers.

Disney is also working on the revival of Dumbo directed by Tim Burton with Eva Green and Danny Devito as its stars. For the live-action remake of Winnie The Pooh, Alex Ross Perry, an Indie filmmaker, has been hired to pen the script with Brigham Taylor producing and Marc Forster directing. However, Tom McCarthy has recently been brought on to rewrite the script.

Cruella's initial script by Aline Brosh McKenna is also being rewritten by Kelly Marcel. Cruella will be starring Oscar award winner, Emma Stone. There will also be a sequel to Maleficent and another Peter Pan story written and directed by David Lowery.

A senior box office analyst, Jeff Bock has also given his two cents saying that he doesn't think Disney is anywhere close to trailing off soon. He thinks that they will run out of their best animated films in maybe a decade, without including the sequel movies such as The Little Mermaid II, Lion King II, Mulan II, Aladdin II, Cinderella II and more.

However, Disney will not be doing any remakes on Frozen, Moana, Lilo and Stitch, The Emperor's New Groove, Princess and the Frog and others as there's an unofficial boundary line at the end of the Disney Renaissance period, around the year 2000 or so. He said that "We're not looking at anything very recent, anything that still feels like it's the provenance of current Disney animation."

Disney's Studio Head, Alan F. Horn has also alleged, during the Beauty and The Beast premiere, that the company remains committed to mining Disney's best characters. Remakes of the classics are "are quintessential Walt Disney company properties and we believe to our toes that we are the company that should bring these stories to the screen in live action. We want to do so with an underscored emphasis on quality – they have to be good."

### 5 HOLLYWOOD MOVIES SHOT IN MALAYSIA

Do you know them all?

Every good slacker needs a great movie watchlist to fill in time better spent revising for tests, meeting assignment deadlines, or just getting out of bed to go to class. Seldom, though, can you flunk out, run a Hollywood movie marathon, and support our local film industry, all at the same time. Here are 5 Hollywood blockbusters (alright, some blockmiddlers as well) shot in the tanah air.

#### 1. Anna and the King



This is the one you're most likely to have heard of - or not, since most readers were toddlers when it hit the big screen. The big name here is Jodie Foster, playing an English schoolteacher whom the King of Thailand falls in love with while she tutors his 50(!) children. The Thai government banned the producers from filming in the country, which is unsurprising, since the romance never actually happened. An earlier version had been banned from Thai screens for showing the King eating with chopsticks. But that was all the better for us down south, as practically the entire film was shot in Malaysia instead – the abundance of tom yum outlets probably won the studio over.

This was a big-budget film, shot mostly in scenic areas like Penang, Ipoh and Langkawi. Keen-eyed viewers will easily identify lots of local landmarks, like Swettenham Pier, the Town Hall and Khoo Kongsi from Penang. The extravagant royal palace would be a little harder to pinpoint, though - it was recreated on 7 acres of land near Ipoh. It tops the list because it's the one picture here to have made it to the Academy Awards.

#### 2. Entrapment

Another (aging) star-studded hit, featuring Catherine Zeta-Jones and Sean Connery of 007 fame, Entrapment is about an insurance investigator who offers to team up with a master art thief on a daring heist. Spoiler alert: it's a trap. Crucially (for the viability of this list), the highlight of the movie, the robbery, takes place in the Petronas Twin Towers. Released in 1999, just a year after the Towers' completion, this scene was probably the 90's equivalent of Tom Cruise scaling the Burj Khalifa in Ghost Protocol. Some other locales also got a share of the attention, including the Malacca River and Pudu LRT Station, Pudu natives will, though, be disappointed to learn that the station featured is actually Bukit Jalil, Pudu being the only name Connery could pronounce.



#### 3. The Sleeping Dictionary

This strange movie makes the list because, despite going straight to DVD and never making it into nearly any cinema, it counts in its cast some pretty bankable stars, including Jessica Alba and Emily Mortimer. The overly-complicated period piece is set in 1930's Sarawak, where, cultural appropriation be damned, Jessica Alba plays an Iban concubine who has to sleep with a British officer in order to teach him the language and customs of her people (there is clearly no other method of tutoring). Starring Naomi Watts and Sean Penn, Fair Game is a true-to-life thriller about an actual CIA undercover agent, whose identity is outed by the White House after her husband criticises the Iraq War. Since Malaysia features here the least, this movie gets the shortest mention.

#### 5. Blackhat

Lest you think we're running out of Made in Malaysia flicks, we round off the list with Thor himself. Chris Hemsworth is the lead for this cyber-action thriller. Bringing the ordinary computer nerd with washboard abs to life on the silver screen, Hemsworth's character is hired by the Chinese and US governments to track down a violent hacking group guilty of destroying a nuclear plant. The emphasis of Japan's culture in valuing pride, passion and dedication in their craft, especially their food, is what truly defines the path of a shokunin for the rest of the world to experience to our own benefit.

## MECHANICAL MIGHT Are Mechanical Keyboards Really That Much Better?

Words are important. Words encode knowledge that otherwise would not have been able to be stored and propagated through the generations over land, sea, and time. What could have we ever be as a human species, if it weren't for the capacity to store and share knowledge for the future generations?

Alas, I'm not going to be talking about the words themselves, but something we seem to take for granted. It is the keyboard. The tool we use in order to bring each letter into existence on a glowing rectangle we call a screen. And I'm not even talking about the virtual kind found on a smartphone either, that is another story worthy of its own stage. Today I'll be speaking for a type of keyboard, the mechanical keyboard.

Everyone has touched a keyboard in their lives. It is virtually impossible to be living in this digital age of social media and memes without ever interfacing with a keyboard. It is sad, however, that we are bombarded with cheaper, mass-produced keyboard which uses a rubber dome, a type of switch. These types of keyboards employ switches which are nothing more than a rubber dome with a piece of electrically conductive material at the top, which when pressed, descends onto an incomplete circuit thereby completing the circuit, inducing a signal which then produces the letter.

Keyboards of this kind are very cheap to produce but offer only a soft, mushy typing experience. There is no joy in typing with these types of switches, because they do not give a tactile response when they are activated. It feels very uncomfortable, especially on aged keyboards where the rubber domes have stiffened over, and typing on them feels like stabbing dough with your fingers. Rubber domes deform easily, each one doing so at different rates. Prolonged usage of such keyboards can easily result in finger fatigue as each key would require varying amounts of force to be activated.

Thus, comes an alternative. The mechanical switch keyboard. These switches are popular amongst gamers and writers (although still a relatively small niche) because of the way the switches are constructed.

Unlike the simple rubber dome switch, two metal contacts and a spring inside a hollow stem are housed in the mechanical switch. By pressing down on the switch, the stem of the switch descends and allows the two metal contacts on its side to complete the circuit, thus activating the switch. Since it uses a metal spring and contacts, each press is guaranteed to be consistent. The switches do not need to be pressed all the way down to register a keypress, owing to the positioning of the metal contacts. They are also very durable, offering a lifespan of about 50 million key presses, compared to the measly 5 million of rubber dome switches.

Every press of the mechanical switch is a delight. Every word made from the pressing of the switches has a feeling of authority, of prestige. The muscles of each of your fingers are allowed to exercise its full might, pressing down against the spring of each switch, and each successful key press is congratulated with a prominent click sound. It brings back the feeling of typing on the age old typewriters, as they are too mechanical in nature, albeit with a different action. Once you try a mechanical keyboard, it is hard to go back.





Currently, there are four popular types of key switches. Namely, blue, brown, black and red. Blues have an audible and tactile click, almost like a typewriter. It is no surprise that these switches are popular among writers. For the browns, you get a tactile bump on its stem to give a tactile feel every time you press the keys, which also helps with typing. They are also popular among gamers and writers but not to the extent of the blues. Now, black switches need a very strong key press, using about 60g of force to actuate the switch. They do not have a tactile bump unlike the previous switches. Finally, the red switches give the same feeling as the blacks except with an actuation force of only 45g, excellent for gaming but still with a following among writers. All of them were once exclusively produced by a German switch company called Cherry, but ever since the patents expired, other companies have











begun to create their own version of the switches.

Mechanical keyboards come in all sorts of configurations as well. Some have cool lighting effects on each key, like patterns that oscillate back and forth and even keys that light up as you press them. Some have built-in USB port hubs so you can connect your mouse to it and save on USB ports for other devices. Most of the keyboards are made to last. You can find them in metallic housing or sturdy plastics. They usually weigh heavier than normal membrane keyboards because they include a metal backplate which fixes the switches in place, giving support to each individual key for comfort and durability. There are even keyboards which are made to look like a vintage typewriter paired with bluetooth functionality to be used with tablets PCs which act like the paper in a typewriter.

All in all, mechanical keyboards are a godsend to those who use the keyboard frequently. They provide consistently solid performance throughout its lifespan, giving each finger a proper way of exercising its duty to punch the keys for that assignment due the next day that you have postponed for almost an eternity.

Editors note: Please don't buy the generic MKBs from "gaming" companies like Razer and such, as you are able to get much better boards for the same price. Do your research!

## DID YOU KNOW MONASH HAS ITS OWN RADIO CHANNEL? MEET RADIO MONASH!

If you have been around for over a semester and have had classes down in the basement in Building 6, you would have probably seen this little tiny room with a huge-as\* poster plastered across its door which says "Radio Monash"." – the door that so happens to be the entrance to a tiny little dungeon that houses a group of well, interesting announcers if I may say so? They play good music, they have got announcers ranting just about anything and they are very bubbly. If you have still no idea what I am talking about, well I did mention their name somewhere up there so you'd probably want to read again about who I am talking about.

Or not. Just keep reading. It's somewhere down there too.

Radio Monash is a student brand radio that was founded a little while back in 2014 by an engineering student named Murad. Having been a part of a radio initiative back in Sri Lanka before that, he came into Monash with the idea of creating a platform that was somewhat similar. He proceeded to approach a few arts lecturers who advised him and for the initial part of the process, he even invested his own money in some of the things that were needed but the university did provide funds for most of the equipment. In 2015, things kicked off pretty well and they even had the opportunity of having renowned radio announcer Prem from Mix FM over to give a talk on how things are handled and done in a radio station. Radio Monash does not stream on a frequency but they are very much available on the internet and you guys can stream online at radiomonash.com.

The club if I may say so, does not have weekly meetings and is divided into two different platforms – the student blog and the radio show. On the radio show particularly, there are different announcers present on different times of the day with each announcer having approximately two hours on each of their slot every week. According to Ling Jie, a representative from Radio Monash, the system has somewhat changed this year where the content of what is being discussed is now streamlined by a radio producer so that the diversity of the topics being discussed is increased. For example, it



would be the radio aesthetics itself which really basically means that a mood or look for that certain hour can be represented by a certain set of playlist, like having Lana Del Rey's songs played on a rainy evening while you lock yourself up in the library 5 days before the exams, all tucked in your sweater and your head banging against the wall (well that's what I'd do at least). The streamlining is seen as important because it inadvertently allows the establishment of a platform that showcases diversity and to a certain extent, function as a representation of the students' voice because not everyone would have the same opinion or the same set of interests.

A general rule that's practiced in Radio Monash is that no personal views are allowed in regards to a certain topic and un-biasness should be maintained during discussions on air and this is imperative especially in exposing the different faucets of the student body and engaging in interviews and conversations with the presidents of different clubs. Speaking of which, they have also had outside artists over for interview, one of it being Alex TBH which was brought in sometime last year to talk about his musical career and just current updates.

On the blog that is also handled by Radio Monash, it just basically functions as an extension of the radio station, either supplementing to the content that is already on air or just as a connection as to when no one is on air (you can't expect them to be in that tiny little dungeon all the time now can you?). For the blog, new writers are recruited and often different topics are covered – whether they are gaming-related articles, travel articles or even lifestyle, things that are just expressed by different kinds of people like the foreign students who have come here to study or even the locals. The student life in Monash is also put

into perspective with different write-ups on the different clubs and more fascinating content like the behind-the-scenes at Radio Monash itself.

Does it get updated every day? Yes, apparently, and there is a schedule of new writers and old writers which sort of help in the organisation of the content and to ensure everything is in sync and relevant as much as possible. This includes the student interviews and student profiles and everything else that may be relevant to the Monash student setting, and this has been a monumental change for the blog this year - the whole streamlining and synching of content that is handled by the editor, Ling Jie. Some of the regulations the blog has for its writers include having them submit a content calendar and drafts of what they have written on before publishing them for editing and proofreading. When it comes to the content itself, there is no strict regulation imposed on that because everyone is ultimately entitled to your own opinion but there is a huge need to respect others when doing so. And the idea of inclusivity and giving everyone the equal opportunity to be a part of the content has strongly been encouraged among members of the team.

Being an organisation on campus that's still trying to find its place among the student community, Radio Monash would definitely appreciate the collaboration and support from all seven thousand of us who are going to be on campus. They have approached different student sections on campus including us, the MUSA Editors and the newly-established MEWS Club and these are all important steps to allow Radio Monash to also be a voice of Monash, despite being in a tiny little dungeon with almost very limited or zero access to the sunlight. Both us the editors and Radio Monash hope that this year proves to be a better year for Malaysia's only licenced university radio station to step it up a notch and find a place in the hearts of all the students with the incredible music they play and the weird yet amazing stuff they talk about!






























































































### MUSA DAY



## International Women's Day

"Forty-four women (40%) of the 110 domestic violence survivors surveyed reported experiences of domestic violence occurring for more than five years; 45 women (41%) for between one and five years; and 21 women (19%) for less than one year. This means that up to 89 women (81%) could be classified as having faced sustained and prolonged violence in the home (more than one year in duration."

-Women's Aid Organisation, Malaysia.

In 2015 alone, the Royal Malaysian Police Force has estimated that there have been over 5,000 cases of domestic violence that were reported, with a huge portion of it involving physical aggression and brutality against women. Being an issue that is often not taken seriously by the general public, it has torn families apart, lead to several murder cases and elevated the number of child sexual abuse cases over the years, most of which were often ignored and merely swept under the carpet. Women who are often targeted because of the general perception that they're weak and incapable are left with no options to resort to and often, the cries of these victims for intervention by the public and law authorities go unheard. It is sad and devastating that this is still a huge issue that we have to face at this time and age and to have violence against women be perceived as something trivial is definitely problematic not just for our generation but for future generations as well.

in conjunction with International Hence, Women's Day on the 8th of March (Wednesday), the Wom\*n's Officers of Monash University Malaysia held a campaign against domestic violence in their effort to create awareness about the needs and ways to combat this act of crime that's affected hundreds of thousands of women, children and men throughout the world. With a brilliant booth set-up outside the library, the campaign was an effort by the Wom\*n's Officers and their group of friends to raise awareness and give students and staff the opportunity to speak up against domestic violence, an issue of paramount importance. Students did so by signing their support on a banner and taking a video pledge, in which most of them vehemently expressed how they felt about domestic violence and their stance when it comes to tackling the issue.



The event started off slow with low turnout at 12p.m, but over time, the crowd grew and grew and by the end of the day, the Wom\*ns Officers had successfully collected over 200 signatures and had a video footage of over 170 people pledging their support to end domestic violence, both of which were incredible accomplishments in their aim to reach out to the general student population to adopt a stance against this crime. Staff members, namely Dr Joseph Goh, Dr Sharon Bong and Ms Vizla Kumaresan, lecturers from the School of Arts and Social Sciences also showed their support by taking time off their hectic schedules to visit the booth and pledge their support for the vital cause. Students from different faculties who participated were also rewarded with delicious home-made cupcakes. Despite not having reached the target they initially had in mind, both Hannah and Jasmine who were responsible for the event expressed how extremely satisfied they were with how it had turned out and they look forward to organizing bigger and better events which tackle issues of gender discrimination in the future.

All in all, the reception the event got was definitely a huge milestone for the Wom\*n's Officers in their effort to engage and to be more interactive with the student community here at Monash and we hope that they continue to organise such amazing events that would bring great significance to the lives of anyone who's ever felt helpless and afraid and who are in dire need of support and assistance.

MuPhaS' Antimicrobial Resistance

## Public Health Campaign

"A post anti-biotic era, in which common infections and minor injuries can kill, it is far from being an apocalyptic fantasy but instead a very real possibility in the 21st century"

-World Health Organisation

On the 15th and 16th of March 2017, the Monash University Pharmacy Society (MUPhaS) together with the International Medical University (IMU) and the Malaysian Pharmacy Students' Association (MyPSA) organised the Antimicrobial Resistance Public Health Campaign as a part of their effort to create awareness on the heightening levels of antimicrobial resistance that has triggered alarms across the medical field all over the world. The primary objective of the event was to bring about a sense of realisation among the general public on the dangerous implications of antimicrobial resistance and to help improvise and increase their knowledge about this highly problematic issue which has rendered medical practitioners helpless when it comes to tackling certain disease outbreaks.

It is vital that the student population was taught what "antimicrobial resistance" was all about and what they can do to minimize the level of resistance microorganisms acquire towards different antimicrobial drugs.

If you're foreign to the whole anti-microbial resistance issue, here's a little bit of fun facts for you:-

- Antimicrobial resistance takes place when bacteria, viruses or parasites acquire the ability to stop the action of antimicrobial drugs like antibiotics, antivirals and anti-parasites from working against them. This ability is often obtained through the process of genetic mutation that takes place in the DNA of the organism itself, causing the DNA to code for enzymes that breakdown these drug components, rendering them useless. It could also be acquired from a series of other organisms through transduction or transformation.
- The reason why antimicrobial resistance exist is BECAUSE OF THE MISUSE OF DRUGS THAT TAKE PLACE and by that IT INCLUDES YOU WHO DO NOT FINISH YOUR ANTIBIOTICS WHEN THE DOCTOR TOLD YOU TO!
- Anti-microbial resistance causes 700,000 deaths annually and that number is expected to HIKE UP to 10,000,000 deaths annually by 2050 if y'all stubborn and don't want to finish them antibiotics!



 There are also bacteria that's resistant to a series of different drugs and they're called Multiple Drug Resistant (MDR) microorganisms or "Superbugs".

Different booths were set-up throughout the event by various health organisations including the representatives from the Ministry of Health, Malaysia who had a mini exhibition on the different type of drugs that were existent in the market today. There were also booths that provided health screenings and T-shirts sale with the latter selling like hotcakes. Activities like the antimicrobial resistance quiz and the antimicrobial resistance exhibition were also organised to further entice students from different schools who dropped by to check out what the event was all about.

The overall reception of the event was said to be pretty incredible with over 400 people turning up to participate and get involved with the campaign over the two-days period and some students were even going around asking if the event was going to go on for a longer period of time – a clear reflection on the positive outlook of the campaign.

A talk was also held on the 16th of March by Dr Mai Chun Wai, the Deputy Chairperson of the Malaysian Pharmaceutical Society – Young Pharmacist Chapter on the topic "Antimicrobial Resistance: What Exactly Did We Miss?" at room 2-1-03.

As a whole, the entire event was a huge success, thanks to the collective effort from the different societies that worked incredibly hard to make sure everything worked out well. MUPhaS and IMU also took the initiative to organise a community outreach programme to educate the public on antimicrobial resistance, an event which was held at Bukit Komanwel on the 18th of March 2017.

In anticipation of the Monash Cup which will happen during the second half of the year, all 4 sports houses had set up recruitment booths outside the library during Week 7 where I had the opportunity to sit with Nur Shanikul Huda, captain of Culebre, for a short interview.

Shanikul is a first year first semester Applied Microbiology student, which makes his position as house captain an amazing feat. When asked how he felt about being elected, Shanikul modestly proclaimed that he really was not expecting much support, as he is a new student and has also never been on the committee. Originally gunning for the position of either vice-captain or publicity officer, Shanikul was surprised and thankful for the support and trust that has been placed in him to lead. Launching off that point, I asked Shanikul how it feels to lead a committee of people who are not only his seniors, but who have also been on the committee before, and would have more experience than himself in dealing with the Monash Cup. Jevon also did note that recruitment is still on-going for all sports, especially for cricket, table tennis, cheerleading, tug of war, obstacle course and women's futsal where players are actually need due to a lack of participation. Before wrapping up the interview, I asked Jevon to share some details on getting students to try-outs. He mentioned that try-outs are normally in Week 3. Students could attend trainings two or three weeks before the try-outs so that players will know each other's existence.

#### LIMA 2017

Late on a Thursday night, the Monash foyer bustled with activity, with Engineering rep, Terry Lee, bellowing out roll-calls while his colleague Jun Mann efficiently registered a line of students and a small crowd milled around, dragging their trolley bags and doing some last-minute packing. At half past ten, the bus arrived, and the 37 students trundled up and settled in for a long ride up north.

For some, it was a shot at taking a weekend vacation in the middle of the semester, to others, a chance to fill their bags with duty-frees good, but to all, it was the opportunity of a lifetime. We were headed to Langkawi Island, for the Engineering School field trip to the biennial (biannual?) Langkawi International Maritime and Aerospace Exhibition (LIMA). Coming in the middle of the study period, it was to be a



flying visit (except for the flying part). The bus ride on the night of the 23rd took us to Kuala Perlis by 6.30 the following morning, where we took an hour-long ferry ride to the island. From the ferry terminal, a tour bus was to take us directly to the air show. But, being typically Malaysian, despite already running a bit late, when Rep. Jun Mann asked the group, "Breakfast or LIMA?" ... well, you can guess the response.

After half an hour at the nearest hawker center, the expedition set off again, with our local tour guide helpfully pointing out historic sights along the way, such as Langkawi's first traffic light, and a night-long karaoke joint named "Little Hatt Yai," where he mysteriously warned us "not to enjoy ourselves there until morning." Through the window, as the bus neared the venue, the first flybys were already visible. Jets in formation darted in and out of view between the pristine green hills, the atmosphere in the bus still as the group mentally urged the driver to get us there faster.

The engineers finally made it onto the airfield at around 11.30. Unfortunately, we got through the gates just as the morning aerial demonstrations were ending – the final Rafale jet finished its display and came into land just as most of us made it out of the queue. That was not much of a damper, though, as there was another session

scheduled for the afternoon and plenty to fill the time in between. On the tarmac were arrayed roughly 40 aircraft from all over the world, ranging from sleek drones to massive military transports. The planes from the stunt squadrons were cordoned off from the public, but visitors were free to get up close and personal with the rest of the craft. To avoid boring the socks off the non-aviation nerds, this writer will not go through every single plane he saw, but some were worthy of notice.

One of these was the refueling tanker KC-135, flown in by the US Air Force. Known as the Stratotanker, it has a trailing boom which is used to refuel other aircraft mid-flight. It is also equipped with its own probe on its nose, which it uses to refuel itself in return. However, its real claim to fame is that it was first built in 1956, and has not left service for 60 years.

The Americans also brought along one of their Unmanned Aerial Vehicles (UAVs) – known as drones to the rest of us. The particular model was the MQ-1 Predator, the first deployed "battlefield" UAV, which basically means it wasn't around just to take pictures. The model on display was not armed, but despite being more than 20 years old the Predator still looked like bleeding edge stuff.



There were several large transport planes on the tarmac, including the Russian Air Force Illyushin II-76, whose huge drooping wings would later block the view during the evening air display. But the real behemoth of the bunch was the Australian C-17A 'Globemaster'. It towered over the rest of the planes and posed severe difficulties for photographers, who could not ever back away far enough to get the whole aircraft in the frame. A friendly RAAF Mechanical Engineer, Lac N. Goulding, rattled off some impressive statistics for this plane, and none more impressive than the fact that it can carry, not one, but three Apache attack helicopters in one go. The C-17 can weigh 465,000 lb on takeoff and carry 77 tonnes of cargo. There are only 8 of them in the Australian air fleet, but this particular plane was no stranger to our shores. having regularly participated in excercises at Butterworth, Penang. Eng. Goulding described its deployments on humanitarian missions to disaster zones in the Phillipines, Nepal and elsewhere.

Like Eng. Goulding, the air crews in attendance at LIMA were extremely friendly and eager to tell the visitors all they needed to know about their aircraft. There were several aviation nerds in the Monash group, including Fahad Zayden, who could identify most of the planes by sight and was eager for a chat with the air force personnel. Among those we met was a 27-year veteran of the Singaporean air force, Eng. K. P. Ang. Our island neighbours had flown in an F-15 fighter, as well as a vicious-looking Apache Longbow helicopter. Despite his aircraft appearing to be armed to the teeth, Eng. Ang insisted, "We don't ever want to use them." Such a mild-mannered man as he was, we took him at his word.





This was all a prelude, though, to the main event, which was the air display scheduled for 2.30pm. However, at the appointed hour, the crowd witnessed, not the Blue Angels, but two Air Asia jets hurriedly clearing the runway. With that done, the real show began.

First off the runway was a Rafale fighter. The single-engine jet twisted and turned with amazing precision, at one point coasting past the crowd while almost standing on its tail. The Malaysian jet which followed more than held its own, and earned resounding cheers as it dropped flares before the audience.

Next up were the squadrons - a grouping of 6 Indonesian propeller planes, and 9 South Korean stunt jets. The planes took off, two or three abreast as they powered down the runway one after the other - and then, flew into the distance and disappeared behind the surrounding hills. Wandering if they had decided to pack it and fly back home, the crowd then diverted its attention to the four Russian 'Knights' taxiing onto the runway. These four Sukhoi Su-30SM's, were, in this writer's opinion, the stars of the show. The maneuvers they performed were, at times, terrifying, the planes passing each other with just a few feet of separation at near-supersonic speeds. It was a marvel to witness the vapour cones forming around the planes as they approached the sound barrier.

Even without the sonic booms, though, the roar of the engines was deafening. The jets staggered their landings, and as each landed, the others performed more and more dangerous stunts. The final plane, obviously piloted by the best of the bunch, was at his most impressive when he seemed to stall his plane and spin it laterally on its nose, like a chopper blade, as it fell straight down, pulling up only when he was just a couple hundred feet off the ground.







When the Russians were done, the earlier squadrons reappeared from behind the hills in a joint formation of 15 planes. The crowd were treated to a majestic flyby from the combined squadron, following which the Indonesian planes broke off, performed a few short maneuvers and landed, clearing the sky for the South Korean Black Eagles.

Being the largest squadron at the show, the Koreans gave the best demonstration of formation flying. The sleek black jets seemed to move in total unison, their maneuvers so graceful that at times you wondered how 9 pilots at such high speeds could be so totally in sync. In fact, on reflection, the physical strength needed to endure the kinds of pirouettes, rolls and high-velocity turns which all the planes carried out seems almost superhuman. The forces acting on their bodies at times approaches 9 g's, more than twice the level that can cause blackouts and even death in ordinary people.

When the Korean squadron landed, the air display was over, and with that, our time at LIMA altogether. By now, the tour group was swimming in perspiration, and made its way back to the bus and thence to our hotel.



The ferry back to the mainland was only scheduled for the next day at 5 pm, meaning a late night was on the cards. Langkawi's trademark being its \*ahem\* cheap beverages, and Engineering students knowing how to party, the rest of this story cannot be put into writing. Suffice it to say, that, somehow, the next day, all 37 students made it safely onto the ferry back to Perlis. After a brief dinner at the only McDonald's in the state, we hopped back on the bus and settled in for a long ride back to Sunway, reaching the campus at 5am on Sunday the 25th.

As much as LIMA had been about seeing great machines in action, it was the human encounters which really made it memorable. Whether it was the USAF engineers enthusiastically talking up their hardy Stratotanker, the Russian staff grumbling at having to take pictures with the nosy visitors (eventually, they disappeared permanently into the bowels of their Illyushin), or the Malaysians telling us the best spots to catch the stunts from, it was a potent reminder of the men behind the machines. Encouragingly, there were many female pilots and personnel in attendance, especially among the American and Australian contingents. There was also the crowd of attendees, some of whom had come from pretty far away, just for the show.

A mixed group of Germans, Austrians and Swiss, some of them clearly veterans, had flown in for just a couple of days to watch the squadrons in action. Overhearing our confused discussions, they helpfully identified all the planes and aerobatic teams for us, even though they struggled slightly with the English.

Whilst awaiting the air display, this writer even managed to negotiate with the promoter for a French VIP jet to get us a tour of the off-limits private plane, making good use of his editorial credentials. Unfortunately, at the scheduled hour, the writer was too distracted by the aerial display and forgot his tour. When we returned, a less-gullible employee had taken over, and sussed us out immediately. He said we couldn't get on the plane but could ask him any questions we wanted for our 'magazine article', to which this writer responded with a series of embarrassed stammers that gave the whole scheme away.

All in all, it was a fantastic experience for everyone, whether they knew what they were in for or not. In fact, judging by their enthusiasm, don't be surprised if some of our Engineering trip-goers make it behind the cockpit one day, too.

The forum started off with an opening speech by Professor Andrew. Following that, Janesh Nathan, our MUSA president took over by updating us students on the current as well as future developments which will take place on campus.

Developments that were mentioned include a collaboration with Radio Monash to hold a session where the students were informed of the ongoing activities. The first session has already been completed. In regards to an increased subsidy for competitions and conferences, more than 300 students have benefited through this, to date. Another successful initiative is the allocation for more PASS sessions to

be held for each school and all the seven school representatives have managed to come through in the process of enhancing the students' learning progress.

The implementation of TEDxMonash was also one of the promises made by MUSA 2017 and as promised, it is currently in its initial stage run. The next step is to hunt for the licence. There have also been new food outlets this semester at the new cafeteria, which is probably our current favourite spot on campus.

In our favour, the request for more tutorial rooms to be opened during Weeks 11, 12 and Swot Vac as well as the increased demand of having lectures recorded or streamed live, for students across all seven schools, have already been brought to the higher-level committee members' attention. The Vice President of MUSA, who is also the Representative for the Campus Education Committee, tells us that Professor Andrew has reported that this already being implemented and is starting with the bigger lectures.

The maintenance of sports facilities is also currently on-going and indoor cricket is now allowed at the futsal court. However, the response in regards to MUSA's proposal to allow Monashians to play outdoor cricket at Taylor's

University Lakeside Campus is still pending. Fortunately, Monash has already received an approval which allows us to utilize Sunway University's field for football practice as our field isn't big enough. Our artificial field will only undergo upgrades in Mid-2018 as part of the campus master-plan.

It's already 2017 but the insufficient parking issue is still at large. The President assured us that this matter will be solved soon. Based on the master plan, the free parking area will soon be converted into a multi-storey car park. However, it will only be completed in due time. The President has also mentioned that the water dispenser issues will also be addressed.

Moving onto the Q&A session, students were given the opportunity to ask questions and were rewarded with free Subway cookies. The key issues that students brought up were their concerns on the availability of tutorial rooms, the seat hogging issue in the library as well as the laptop loaning services discontinuation issue, the WIFI at Monash, clarification on the disappearance of food trucks from two years ago, the carpark issues and the limited areas for students to study on campus. Some also brought up the issue of cyberbullying through the Monash Confessions page on Facebook and what we can do about racism in Monash.







First off, regarding the tutorial rooms, a student asked for the allocation of students' usage not to just be during the final weeks of the semester, but during the mid-semester break as well. Janesh thought that it can be done after further confirmation. Another student had also questioned the cleanliness of the tutorial rooms and lecture halls throughout the semester. This led to the following question on whether there are rats on campus, as a few students have claimed to see them in Audi 2.

In regards to the seat hogging issue, a solution proposed was to allocate lockers, free of charge, in the library. This is because many students leave their belongings to grab a quick meal as it can be bothersome to carry heavy books and laptops back and forth to the library. Janesh's personal comment was that the main motive behind seat hogging is more of the assurance of having a seat for the respective seat hoggers (Yes, we know that's probably not a real word) once they come back to the library rather than the trouble it causes them to carry their things around. Ultimately, Janesh said that we should treat others how we want to be treated, so don't hog seats guys!

Another common issue, which results in majority of us being utterly frustrated is the Wi-Fi. This issue has many root causes. However, should students have any issues with the Wi-Fi, just fill in a simple Wi-Fi complain form. The link can be obtained from your respective school

representatives. It will automatically be forwarded to the ITS department, as they won't be able to offer assistance through mere verbal complaints. "So the more you submit, the more data they have, the more action they can take on it," said the School of Engineering Rep of MUSA 2016, at the forum, having addressed this issue last year.

With regards to the food supply issue, a question was raised on the availability of food trucks which were allowed in campus two years ago. Janesh addressed this issue saying the food trucks operating back then lacked the licence needed to operate legally. However, MUSA is trying their best to bring in food trucks, with licences, from Kuala Lumpur. As the prices of food are slightly overpriced at the new cafeteria, Janesh said that should there be new options of food introduced. the prices would have to be reasonable and with appropriate portions. A student had also asked for the prices of food in the cafeteria to be made known physically on a placard as she was charged with different prices for the same meal each time she made a purchase.

Regarding the carpark issue, one of our Editors had suggested that the Monash parking stickers be brought back as there are Sunway students as well as Sunway Medical Centre staff that take up the parking lots at the free carpark area.

This is creates a huge inconvenience as it decreases the availability of parking space for the rest of us actual Monash students. The President also proposed to have more sheltered carparks. Fortunately, for some students, drivers/parents are now allowed to enter campus for pick up but only when it's raining. However, they should only enter when students are ready to go, to avoid traffic build up. A student has also asked if it's possible to have a zebra crossing from the BRT carpark to the university, despite having the overhead bridge, as many students would still prefer to just cross the road instead of going up and coming back down.

A question was also posed as to how MUSA plans to overcome the chances of cyberbullying through the Monash Confessions page. Janesh has recommended that "we raise awareness that we have equal opportunities, different but equal and that cyberbullying should be something we're not advocating." In regards to racism in Monash, a concern raised by a student, Janesh tells us to send him an email about it. He also promises that he would bring it up to the admins, should it involve "racist TITAS lecturers," where




just filling up forms isn't enough.

One of the last key issues mentioned in the forum is the lack of availability of areas for students to study. Janesh has reported that, tentatively, there will soon be another two extra levels of the library, as well as a double storey bridge, that students will be able to utilize. A student has also questioned why the area outside the library can't be opened until 12am on a weekly basis as well. The School of Engineering Rep for 2017 then helped clarify that this student meant the two rooms outside the library, near ITS. Janesh responded by promising to bring it up to the admins.

Other concerns brought up by the students were what MUSA plans to do to counter the computer labs' timetabling inaccuracy, if the Sunway library membership period could be extended, the preposition of a pigeon hole outside each lecturers' room, the reason behind the missing gym barbells, what happened to the CIMB ATMs, why there wasn't a formal notice on the resignation of the Activities Chairperson, the lack of recreational spaces on campus, if we could have an overhead bridge connecting the cafeteria and the library, and if a quota would be imposed on the number of students Monash takes in, in the future. In regards to the last one, Janesh assures us that "If students meet the entry requirements and are projected to get good grades, the university will not reject them."

Janesh had also released information regarding some of the past as well as future events to be held. Past events such as the KL Tour and Teh Tarik with MUISS as well as the Monash Cultural Night which was held on the 7th of May. These activities were all under MUISS.

MUSA's school reps have also done a great job planning the various movie nights, finance seminars, dodgeball competitions, Buddy-Buddee Night, LIMA trip, bazaars, etc.



He also mentioned that Mingle Night, held in the first Week of the semester itself, was a big achievement. In regards to the raves music festivals we've had, the President assures us that MUSA may want to keep up with the large scale festivals, but only in Semester 2. Janesh garnered much laughter from the student body when he jokingly said, "Go home, eh, go big or go home."

He then mentioned that this semester's Orientation Bash was one of the best that they've ever had. For further updates, do refer to their Facebook page. With regards to the Facebook page, they had started the year with 7,000/8,000 likes and had broken the 10,000th mark as of today, which he thinks that itself is a very good achievement.

With regards to the Editorial team (that's us), the President had said that "they've covered almost every event on campus and their viewership for MUSA Monga has shot up through the roof almost four times compared to previous years. I think that itself is a very big achievement for MUSA." Thank you to those who have been following up with MUSA Monga's updates!

The session was then concluded with a cookie giveaway session. Yes, that's right! Everyone who had attended the forum was eventually given a free Subway cookie anyway! Anyway, thanks for reading and have a productive Swot Vac everyone!

## "Yes Means Yes" Campaign

"No means no. It does not mean you have to try harder" – these were the words of Mdm. Vizla Kumaresan, clinical psychologist and lecturer at Monash University Malaysia during the talk titled "Yes Means Yes: The Importance of Consent Before Sex" that was held in conjunction with the YesMeansYes for Sexual Consent campaign that was organised by the Mental Health Ambasassadors of Monash University Malaysia. The campaign was a collective effort by all members to create awareness on the importance of receiving and giving consent before sex takes place.

Held on the 12th April 2017 at the foyer of the university, the campaign was directed towards members of the university community regardless of gender, race and sexuality, all in the hope that in one way or another, they would be able to open the eyes of the community today on how important it is to consider consent as a huge part in engaging with someone, whether physically or emotionally. It was highly imperative that such an initiative was brought up because it cannot be denied that the idea of consent itself has been taken so lightly by people these days, often regarding it as something that is absolutely unnecessary especially in relationships where one assumes he or she is

always going to be entitled to the other person's body regardless if they want it or not. This is very damaging as it affects everyone though most of the time, women end up becoming the main victims. Consent is vital in every kind of relationship and its importance needs to be addressed and respected.

In the talk that was delivered by Mdm Vizla, she also emphasized that one should never assume everything is just a yes, even when "no" may not be the answer and while one may say "yes" to one thing, it does not function as an approval stamp for anything more because consent is an on-going process. For example, she may agree to kiss you, but she might not agree with you taking off her clothes while you kiss her. She also reiterated that it is always important to ask and to never assume things and if these things are taken lightly, such relationships could end up becoming abusive, both physically and mentally.

Purple ribbons were given out during the campaign as well – a symbolic of taking a stance against domestic violence, another issue that was addressed during the campaign. Miss Vaishna Santhar, training officer at the Women's Aid Organisation (WAO) was present to give a talk on "Recognising, Responding to and Referring



Domestic Violence Cases" in where she highlighted the existence of WAO, a centre that helps and aid women who suffer from abuse, either from their spouses or siblings and function as a refuge centre for these women so that they would learn to pick themselves up again, get empowered and face the world with more courage and strength. It also houses children suffering from child abuse and constantly work governmental organisations as well as the police force to address such cases.

T-shirts as well as badges were on sale during the event as a part of the initiative to garner support. A march was also held before the start of the campaign where during each stop, brilliant performances were held by students, Sarah Ann and Jay Vee.

The campaign also had a few boards put up to gain feedback from students about what they would want from their romantic partners as well as statistics on domestic abuse that have taken place, like for example, did you know that on average, every 35 minutes, a girl or woman is assaulted in Malaysia?



It is pretty terrifying to come to know of these numbers and still ignore the fact that domestic violence which is a lead up from the lack of ability to take "no" as an answer is very real and existent and needs to be addressed quickly before the number shoots up even more to the point where we might not even have control over our own bodies anymore.

It was a great campaign with a great initiative and we do hope that more events like these do take place, especially when it concerns young people who may or may not be educated on such important issues like this one.
