One: you can't amass a complex vault of human experience without the freedom and space to diverge from day-to-day life.

That creative space we have – both mental and physical – has it been drowned out by the many other competing priorities of the dau?

Walt Whitman and his song of eternity capturing the shifting landscapes of emergent America, the streets and harbours and people he would have strolled among thousands of times over. Matsuo Basho wanders into the northern interior of Honshu on foot and pens hokku along the way². Virginia Woolf had Asheham House in the

I suspect a fair proportion of creative work — public and private - would have taken root in the time one intended to do nothing 'productive'.

Today - when each moment burgeons with opportunities, challenges and the colliding lives of others; when space and distance has shrunk dramatically; when information is on standby 24/7—one is forced to choose much more prudently.

If you have to take a journey like Basho's to find it, you'd have to put things on hold.

To be or not to be, that is still a contemporary question.

Precisely because creative experience does not cave in to reductionism, you can't really put it on hold – it's all or nothing, like the firing of neuronal synapses upon threshold. People who have worked feverishly on their ideas and passions know this.

One particularly thoughtful teenager chose neither A nor B, clarifying that he would want to be an artist, one who was capable of all arts. Thinking back-that was a rather perfect answer. Why should one define their personhood by occupation?

Perhaps this aspiration to be a Renaissance person doesn't have a deadline, but to keep it ignited among things that do takes an artful form of procrastination altogether.

As Friedrich Nietzsche once articulated:

"If there is to be art, if there is to be any aesthetic doing and seeing, one physiological condition is indispensable: frenzy." 5

That hidden self draws out coherence from the dissonance encountered in modern times. But to let it work we have to take the plunge. Inspiration can be fleeting, but I don't necessarily think it abandons easily. If ever you see that "arch wherethro'/gleams that untravell'd world"⁶, the pursuit just might be worth it.



E are young. We have all the time in the world. We dream of travelling the world. We are unstoppable. But, wait, wait, wait! There's just one tiny obstacle. We don't have fat wads of cash just sitting in bank vaults waiting to be spent on 5-star luxury cruises in Nice. We definitely can't afford to party in Ibiza with Kate Moss, Rihanna, and the rest of them. "But, I want to see the world!" Here's the truth. We may not be able to travel like Donald Trump does on a measly student budget but we can still see the world. I'm going to give you some tips on travelling like the *kiamsap*, stingy student that you are.

ACCOMMODATION

Hostels

If you are looking for a place where you can easily meet up with other travellers with the security a hotel provides at a fraction of the latter's price, a hostel is your best bet. You can book women-only, men-only, mixed sex dorm rooms, shared private rooms, or even hog a whole private room to yourself.

Many hostels are listed on HostelBookers, Hostel-World. Some are even listed on Booking, Agoda, and even Trip Advisor. You can also look up a hostel on Facebook and ask if you can book directly with them to avoid the deposit fees HostelBookers and other sites charge. Read the reviews. Figure out your priorities.

If your only concern is for your wallet, then go for the cheapest deal. In reality, it's often more complicated than that. We want clean beds and showers, friendly and professional staff, a central location, and all for a few dollars. Anymore and we'll cry murder!

Check for hidden charges. Some hostels charge additional fees for WiFi service, breakfast, tea, and so on. If you're looking for a place where you can hang out with other backpackers, look out for hostels that make an effort to organize mixers and parties. If you're looking for more privacy but don't want a hotel room, look for private rooms in mom-and-pop hostels. These are usually run by families.

<u>Tips</u>: Don't fall for low prices. Don't skimp on your priorities. Plan your dates. The earlier you book, the lower hostel prices are.

<u>Sites</u>: HostelBookers, HostelWorld, Booking, Agoda

Have you ever wanted a home away from home? Rent it then. Websites such as Airbnb allow you to book strangers' rooms, apartments, and even mansions for the duration of your stay. You could have all the comforts of home without having to pay through your nose.

Sometimes, you'll have to share the space with the owner. That can be quite fun. If your host is friendly and welcoming, you'll find yourself enjoying the city far more than you would, if you'd been on your own. Sometimes, the owner leaves you the keys and you're just free to do whatever you want.

Check first. During the peak season, renting someone's house can be cheaper than staying in hostels. In Bordeaux, I rented a flat for 18 euros while hostels charged exorbitant rates of 30-40 euros or 120 – 160 ringgit for a dorm bed. In other cities, not so much. In Singapore, some owners were charging 42 – 50 Singaporean dollars or a hundred ringgit a night. Some hostels also advertise their services on these websites. An alternative to renting an apartment is to swap houses.

Sites: Airbnb, VRBO, Roomorama, 9flats



Couchsurfing

The best way to save on accommodation is to surf someone's couch. Make a list of all the countries you want to visit and all the relatives and friends you have in those countries. That way, you can save on accommodation. I know what you're thinking. You're thinking that it's not right to take advantage of the hospitality of a distant relative you barely talk to or a friend who is more of an acquaintance.

Then, why not stay with a total stranger?

I had the same concerns at first. I'd heard horror stories about couchsurfers using the opportunity to hook up with hosts and other travellers. I'm not going to lie to you and tell you that the couchsurfing and hosting community is a bed of roses. I have gotten invites from male hosts who "are lonely and love Asian girls."

If you're looking to meet a friendly, nice host who can provide you with a roof over your head and hot showers for the duration of your stay, Couchsurfing provides great opportunities. When you're looking for a host, make sure he or she has references from two surfers or more. Read the host's preferences for guests properly. If you're lucky, you'll get a room all to yourself.

However, most hosts are often young working adults who don't have a lot of space and so you'll have to make do with a mattress, sleeping bag, or sofa bed. Sometimes, you'll have to share a room or even the bed with the host. Some prefer to host surfers of the same sex. Some can only host one surfer at a time. Some prefer to host non-smokers or people without pets.

All Couchsurfing hosts are required to state their preferences explicitly. So, read each host's preferences and their references carefully and send a thoughtful, detailed request about your travel dates, your plans for the trip, and introduce yourself. It's a clichéd point but be honest and be sincere.

<u>Tip</u>: Bring a gift for your host be it flowers from the local florist or tea from your country.



Voluntourism

Volunteer at an orphanage and get free food and board. This form of tourism is quickly gaining traction. You could pick grapes in a vineyard in Bordeaux for several hours and head off to see the city for the rest of the day. Do talk to the company or the owner and find out the working hours, work requirements, and whether you would need a work visa. Best of all, you could include your volunteering experiences on your resume.

Sites: WWOOF, Workaway, HelpX



Trains

On that note, just because something is cheap doesn't mean it's the best. The rail service may be really cheap but if the railway company is known for train delays and inefficiency in general, perhaps it would be better to forgo a cheap train ticket for something more time-efficient.

Malaysia's national rail service, KTM, is known to break down in the middle of journeys. You also have to bear in mind that rail services are susceptible to forces that are out of your control such as local strikes. While in France, I had the honour of witnessing a SNCF strike. I was right in the midst of a protest. Trains were delayed and cancelled. Talk about experiencing French culture!

I'd bought a 17.50 euro ticket for a direct train from Paris to Amboise, the city where Leonardo da Vinci was buried. The trains they offered in compensation took twice as long as to reach Amboise. I also had to pay an additional 17 euros, because it was an indirect route and I had to switch trains.

In some countries, the earlier you book tickets, the lower prices are. In others, prices are fixed.

The point here is that you have to be aware of local conditions. An online guide to international railway travel has been provided by the Man in Seat 61.

<u>Tips</u>: Use your student discount. Forgo the rail pass.

Buses

Buses are becoming increasingly popular with the cost-conscious traveller. You could take a bus from Amsterdam to Paris for 17 euros and see Brussels on the way. Buses and cars are, however, constrained by local traffic conditions and are affected by local road-works, as well as laws on speeding.

Remember to bring some snacks and a neck pillow or scarf along. Budget bus companies don't offer free lunches.

<u>Tip</u>: Flash your International Student Identity Card and ask if you can get a student or youth rate.

<u>Sites</u>: Megabus (Europe/US/UK), Greyhound (US), GoToBus (Europe, US, Mexico, Brazil)

Rideshare

If you don't mind being constrained by traffic conditions and want to meet some locals, make some plans to carpool or share a ride. In many regions, carpooling would save you a lot of money. A rideshare from Berlin to Warsaw would cost you 30 euros while German railways would charge you 49 euros for a train ride.

Your concerns about security are perfectly legitimate. I mean, how could you possibly know you're not sharing the car with a serial killer? Many car-sharing sites have safeguards in place. Drivers and passengers are required to verify their identities.

To point out the obvious, only contact drivers who have good references. Read between the lines. Although some reviewers might be blunt about their experiences, others might couch their experiences in more courteous terms. A former passenger at the receiving end of some unwanted innuendo may hint at the incident by saying, "He is really affectionate and flirtatious."

On some sites, you can also message the reviewers and ask them about their experiences. You will have to pay for the driver's gas and perhaps share the ride with other passengers. Do socialize. Don't get into a car and ignore the driver and the other passengers. Do show your appreciation for the driver by offering a gift.

Tip: Being polite and nice goes a long way.

Rent a car

If you are travelling with friends and have a valid driving licence, you could rent a car from a rental agency or even from locals. A rental in Bulgaria only costs you 20 euros per day. Get three or four friends to share driving duties with you and you would each only pay four to five euros per day. Do be aware of speeding limits. Above all, use that spunky brain of yours and stay street smart.

Sites: ZipCar, Get Around, FlightCar (US)

Hitch a ride

Hitchhiking is absolutely free. With free stuff comes great risk. In some countries, it is easier to get a ride from locals than in others. Hungary, for example, doesn't have the best hitchhiking culture. Prepare a sign stating your name and destination. Hold out your sign and give a thumbs up.

It would do you no harm if you joined Facebook groups such as Liften in Nederland en Belgie or Hitchhiking Europe. Note the driver's name, carplate number, appearance, and other relevant details. Let as many friends as possible know these details.



If you don't feel safe at any point, you can get out of the car at any point. Thank the driver and ask if he or she can drop you off then. Having pepper spray or a pointed object such as a penknife or a key would also be useful in fending off unwanted advances.

Fly high

Budget airlines are all the rage nowadays. In many regions, flying gives you more value for money than alternative modes of transportation. Compare ticket prices on Skyscanner, Momondo, Kayak, and then see if the airline's website offers a lower price. Subscribe to their newsletters, Facebook pages, Twitter accounts, and so on.

Many airlines often have flash sales. AirAsia has at least two Free Seats sales per year where airfare is reduced to the fuel surcharge and airport taxes. Join their contests. Become a member and collect flyer miles which can then be used to redeem seats.

Collect airline magazines and enter the contests in them. One of Europe's most popular budget airlines, Ryanair, holds a monthly contest where contestants are supposed to take fun photos of themselves with the airline's magazine, Let's Go with Ryanair.

<u>Tips</u>: Look out for student discounts. When comparing airfares and booking seats, use a private browser as airlines tend to raise prices when you refresh or visit the page.

<u>Sites</u>: Ryanair, EasyJet, Wizzair (Europe), Southwest Airlines, Spirit Airlines (US), AirAsia, Tiger Airways (Asia)

FOOD

If you are staying with a friend or a Couchsurfing host, count yourself lucky as most hosts are very generous and will let you use their kitchen and share any food available.



But, as many Couchsurfing hosts are often young adults who have to pay the rent and other bills, do chip in for groceries or buy your own fruits and supplies.

Hit up the local markets and supermarkets for fruits and bread. Some supermarkets have discounts for members, so do ask your host if he or she has a membership card you could borrow for the shopping trip.

Visit local festivals and markets for some free tidbits and snacks. Visit the local bakeries. In France, a good baguette can last for a day and a half and will only cost you a euro.

Eat with locals. A website called Eatwith lets people list lunch or dinner parties and meal plans. Prices are suggested donations. You could have a German brunch in San Francisco for 23 USD or a 3-course Mexican fusion dinner in Los Angeles if you like.

<u>Sites</u>: Eatwith, Eat With a Local, Meal Sharing, Colunching

ATTRACTIONS

Take a walking tour for free. Google "Free things to do in (city name)". Use the Internet to your advantage. Look up the tourism office's website or bookmark Lonely Planet's guide for free attractions.

There are lots of free entry museums in many countries. Just ask the Tourism Office or Google it. You can also attend museum nights. Most cities in the Netherlands have museum nights, a festival of sorts where museums are open until two or three in the morning.

Getting a tourist pass is up to you. It might prove detrimental if you don't really use it. Most tourist passes offer you free or discounted entry to local attractions. Some include discounted metro passes. If you're intent on visiting free-entry attractions that can be accessed without the pass, then it would be better to just get a one or two-day travel pass.

In countries like Singapore where everything is so closely connected, it's actually possible to forgo the travel pass and walk from one attraction to another. Of course, getting a pass would be easier on your feet.



4. EXPERIENCE A MULTITUDE OF NEW CULTURES

You may be living in the Netherlands, but you're not just experiencing Dutch culture or the cultures of all twenty-eight member states of the European Union and the twenty-two other European countries not formally part of the EU. You're also being exposed to the cultures of former European colonies. You'll get to meet people from Curaçao, the Caribbean islands, Suriname, and so on.

I can hear you saying, "But, I could receive similar amounts of exposure to different cultures in the UK or the US! What's so different about Europe?" Sure, you could be exposed to just as many cultures in the any country popular with students. You're being exposed to a different culture anytime you meet someone from another country. People carry their cultures with them.



The fact that there are so few travel restrictions makes it easier for Europeans and citizens of former European colonies to travel within the EU. You wouldn't just be meeting Dutch people; you'd be meeting students and expatriates who come from all corners of the world.

3. LEARN NEW LANGUAGES

The EU alone has twenty-four official languages including Dutch, Finnish, French, German, Italian, Spanish, and Swedish. And yes, English is one of those twenty-four languages. Can you then imagine the number of languages spoken in Europe?

Furthermore, with Western European countries being popular destinations for immigrants, it wouldn't be surprising to hear people speaking Chinese, Arabic, Swahili et cetera.

2. TRAVEL

If you have the necessary travel documents, you could visit all fifty European countries if you put your mind to it. Being in a country so different from yours, living on a continent worlds away, you're forced to step out of your comfort zone. You're constantly challenged to re-evaluate your lifestyle, priorities, and fears.

Faced with a culture of consensus, you'll be forced to ask yourself, "Is it really worth it for my voice to be heard first?" The ubiquity of recycling bins and facilities makes it easy for you to live a green lifestyle. You'll start rethinking the need to get plastic bags from your local grocer.

DEFENDING CGPA & ANCIENTS


Monash Dota 2 Tournament











THE passion and love for the immensely popular multiplayer online battle arena (MOBA) video game: Defense of The Ancients 2 (DoTA 2), among the students of Monash University Malaysia, were indisputable throughout the 2 long days of the Monash DoTA 2 Tournament. A year ago, the Tournament was hosted at Monash University Malaysia itself, but its popularity and potential proved worthy of a new arena: the FTZ Asia Net Cyber Café. This year, a total of 24 teams, with 5 members per team, participated for alory, fun and bragaing rights.

The Tournament was held in a round-robin format: each team would play a best of 1 match against every other team in the same group on Day 1. On Day 2, the 2 best teams in each group would then advance to the quarter-finals. DoTA 2 is a team-oriented video game, where 5 players band together to destroy the other team's "Ancient": a monolithic structure lying deep behind the enemy team's base, which is the final objective of the game.

The game mode used in competitive matches is "Captain's Mode", where each team assigns a player to be "captain" and both teams' captains take turns banning 5 heroes (preventing either team from selecting) and picking 5 heroes (playable characters for themselves) out of a current active roster of 102 unique heroes. The entire pick and ban phase of a game is colloquially known as a "draft".

As the clock crept past 9 am on Day 1, the teams gathered at the cyber café's entrance to register and get acquainted with their battle stations, whilst organizers, committees and commentators



made final adjustments and preparations for their arduous day ahead.

A tense atmosphere filled the entire cyber café as the first matches began; the players' intense focus piercing through the clamor of noise, music and sound effects throughout the venue. Their focus maintains clear communication, crucial in such games, with their fixed expressions only broken by game-defining celebratory shouts and empowering battle cries.

Behind the scenes, a duo of commentators broadcasted the

matches live on a popular video game streaming website known as Twitch. The commentators were stationed in "Siberia": the cold server room, where the matches were thoroughly scrutinized and narrated expressively by Vinod and Ken Jin. The slugfest continued well until evening, a combination of exhaustion and various emotions replaced the contestants' expressions as the day drew to a close.

As the dust settled on Day 1, only 8 teams remained standing. Unbelievably, every group had a team that finished undefeated and another team ended with only a single loss. Day 2 was guaranteed to be the clash of titans!

THE REMAINING TEAMS WENT HOME, CONFIDENT BUT RESTLESS FOR THEIR UPCOMING BATTLES.

The format switched on Day 2 to a single elimination; best of 3 series for all matches (quarter finals, semi-finals and grand finals). Thus, every team henceforth must win 2 games in a match to advance. Day 2 began in an identical, orderly fashion, despite the contestants' jitters and excitement.

The remaining teams arrived early to get accustomed to their battle stations and begin for battle. Nonetheless, the tense atmosphere grew denser as the remaining teams were stationed closer to each other, as the battles that day determined the victors of the tournament.

However, 2 new challengers appeared as commentators. Chi Fung, a member and offlaner of the "MONOSHBOYS" team and their impromptu coach, Jeffery Thiry volunteered to assist the commentators on Day 2, albeit not qualifying for Day 2.

SOME TEAMS WERE SURPRISED TO BE HERE,

"we never expected to make it this far," says Ken, captain of "Roti Canai Gaming": a team which went undefeated through the round robins. Some teams shared Ken's sentiments, but everyone marched forth with confidence into an entirely new ball game.

Vinod and Jeffery both mentioned that Day 2's format switched into a series that would be interesting to watch, as teams would have to learn and adapt to each other; improvising



strategies and unveiling hidden drafts. Once more, the day progressed similarly to Day 1. Teams "Bobo Leon" and "Why Ah" won their quarter final matches with 2 consecutive victories, whereas teams "Oozma Kappa" and "Harrison Jones" advanced by winning the 3rd game in their quarter final matchup.

The semi-final matchups were: "Bobo Leon" versus "Oozma Kappa" and "Why Ah" versus "Harrison Jones" respectively. While every game in the semi-finals was a tough brawl, no game was as intense and crowd-pleasing as the 2nd game between "Why Ah" and "Harrison Jones". "Bobo Leon" now needed to win 2 consecutive games to claim the throne, but that didn't demotivate the members of "Bobo Leon" as they pressed the attack on the 2nd game with a Legion Commander to win in stule.



"Why Ah" celebrated their well-deserved victory with a short break before their grand final match against "Bobo Leon", whereas "Oozma Kappa" and "Harrison Jones" duked it out for 3rd place. Right before the grand finals, a stranger known only as Sheveen decided to help commentate the match as a co-caster.

THE GRAND FINAL MATCH HAD NO SHORTAGE OF ADRENALINE

But for both evenly skilled teams - the games were decided at the draft phase. "Why Ah" won against "Bobo Leon" during their first game of the grand finals with an early to mid-game lineup,
